**waterSmartSM Honors 12 Cobb County Students
in Seventh Annual Allatoona Ally Artist Challenge**

- Talent of local students on display at Allatoona Ally Autograph Party on Feb. 7 -

MARIETTA, Ga. (Jan. 27, 2012) – The Cobb County-Marietta Water Authority (CCMWA) and Cobb County Water System applaud the winners of the Seventh Annual Allatoona Ally Artist Challenge. The top 12 drawings will be featured in a coloring book and a ceremony will be held to honor the artists on Tuesday, Feb. 7, at the Cobb County Central Library at 5 p.m. The winners will be sworn in as Junior Water Deputies and a Lake Allatoona representative will speak to students and their families about water conservation.

The Artist Challenge called for Cobb County fourth- and fifth-grade students to draw Ally, the scaly-but-lovable ambassador for Lake Allatoona, conserving water in her home and community. Nearly 750 students from 20 Cobb County elementary schools participated. This year's winners include:
