waterSmartSM Honors 12 Cobb County Students in 10th Annual Allatoona Ally Artist Challenge

MARIETTA, Ga. (Feb. 10, 2015) – The Cobb County-Marietta Water Authority (CCMWA) and Cobb County Water System congratulate the 12 Cobb County elementary school students chosen as this year’s winners of the 10th Annual Allatoona Ally Artist Challenge.

Cobb County fourth- and fifth-grade students were invited to create coloring book illustrations depicting Lake Allatoona’s own ambassador, Allatoona Ally, in her efforts to educate others about water conservation. The challenge received more than 535 entries from 27 participating schools.

The coloring book featuring the top 12 entries will be distributed throughout the community and available for free download at watersmart.net. In addition, an autograph party will be held to honor the winning artists on Wednesday, Feb. 18 at 5 p.m. at the South Cobb Regional Library. Park Rangers from Allatoona Lake will swear in the new Junior Water Deputies and will speak to the students and their families about the importance of water conservation.
